WHILE THE COMMUNITY around us is moving fully into Phase-2 of Emerging Wisely, here at Inclusion NWT we are still proceeding with an abundance of caution.

FREE LAWN-CARE FOR SENIORS


AS A THANK-YOU to residents for their loyal patronage, The Odd Job Squad now offers some complimentary services, until July 31.
